Dear Parents/Carers

I hope everyone enjoyed their half term break and took advantage of the unseasonably warm weather. For me, it was lovely to be able to spend time in the garden, enjoy reading a few new children's novels and get out walking in the sunshine.

The children have settled back well to their learning. We are fortunate to have many links with the University Colleges and already Year 6 have visited the Zoology Museum, Year 3/4 have worked with scientists from the university and next week Year 5 are off to the Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology. We are so lucky to have these facilities on our doorstep and they help our children to develop an even deeper understanding of the curriculum.

There has been lots of discussion nationally on social media about World Book Day and dressing up as book characters. Our children seem to enjoy this aspect of our Reading and Writing Week and it gives us an additional opportunity to talk about books with them. Remember costumes don't need to be complicated or expensive, there are many school children found in children's novels. For example Matilda, Charlie and James are in Roald Dahl books, Percy Jackson and Tom from Tom's Midnight Garden to name just a few.

Teachers are constantly keeping themselves up to date with current children's literature so that we can recommend books to our children. My goal, which I will be launching with the children as part of World Book Day, is to read a children's novel each fortnight. Can you set a challenge for you and your family in relation to reading and build in regular time to talk about reading? My current book is The Boy at The Back of the Classroom.

Year 3 – 6 meals cost £2.25 per day


Reception and Year 1 and Year 2 are entitled to a universal free school meal.

The main aim of World Book Day in the UK and Ireland is to encourage children to explore the pleasures of books and reading by providing them with the opportunity to have a book of their own. Thanks to the generosity of National Book Tokens Ltd, publishers and booksellers, every child will receive a book voucher. They can take their voucher to a local bookseller and can use it to get £1 off any book or audio book costing over £2.99 at a participating bookshop or book club (terms and conditions apply).

On the day children can dress up as a well-known character from a book or magazine they have read. The children will be taking part in a fashion show, to celebrate their favourite characters and their favourite books within our community of readers.
