Margaret Winchcomb, school governor recommends. Furry Bear, by AA Milne from Now We Are Six

1. Why did you enjoy this poem? It makes me feel warm and cosy imagining, especially when it is cold, just how lovely it would be to be a bear with lots of fur. Winnie-the-Pooh has written this poem and uses his own special words like 'snew' and 'friz'. I find it reassuring to know that someone (some bear) as famous as Pooh can struggle to use the words he already has to say what he means.

2. Where did you find / hear about this poem?

My dad used to read this poem, and others in the book, to me when I was little.

3. Has the poet written any other materials?

Yes, the Winnie-the-Pooh stories are the most famous, and there are also more poems in a book called 'When we were very young'. My dad is now reading the books to my children and I really enjoy listening to his voice and style of reading. The stories always make me laugh.


Mrs. Cowe recommends. 'Blow your nose, Big Bad Wolf', by Steve Smallman

...prepare to have your mind BLOWN!


This book will help you find confidence, resilience and determination. This guide will help you learn from the best, to get over failures and nail the 'practice makes perfect' attitude!




Joshua in Year 1 recommends, 'Billionaire Boy' by David Walliams

'Furry Bear' by AA Milne



Mildred Hubble and her friends, Maud and Enid return to school with a new teacher and something unusual is afoot... Despite having to contend with spiteful Ethel Hallow, Mildred saves the day. This is a series of Worst Witch books, written with humour and brilliant illustrations. Recommended for 7-10year olds.



Alex in Year 4 recommends,

'Dog Man' by Dav Pilkey 'Dog man' is a funny comic that can be enjoyed by

all ages. The author and illustrator is Dav Pilkey. He lives on Bainbridge Island, Washington. There are 18 Dog man comics currently and all of them include flip-o-rama. Flip-o-rama is an animating technique, only used by Dav. I like that the artwork is very

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simple but still very good. The main character is Dog man, a policeman.

Mrs. Morris, Inclusion mentor, recommends, 'The Girl of Ink & Stars' by Kiran Millwood Hargrave

The story follows a young girl called Isabella, who longs for freedom and would like to be free from harsh regime imposed upon the residents of Island Joya. She would like to explore the faraway lands her father, a cartographer, once mapped. Her friend, the daughter of the governor of the island disappears. Isabella feels she must find her friend and she dress like a boy to find her; she uses her cartography skills; learnt from her father to map her journey. She has a special

map that her mother had drawn, this helps her map the mysterious island. It is a mysterious story one of friendship and sadness but there is happiness in the final chapters.

This is a beautiful tale full of hope and heartbreak, magic and adventure. The plot, at times, can be complicated and has various settings and characters, with at times, challenging vocabulary. I'd recommend for Upper Key Stage 2.





***** Julia in Year 3, recommends, 'Princess Mirror-Belle and the Party Hoppers by Julia Donaldson This book has three short stonet It is for ages 6-9. In the book, there is a girl called Ellen. Whenever she looks in the mirror, her clone, Princess Mirror-Belle, appears. Princess Mirror-Belle is a royal princess from another land.
