
### reading.

Emily in Year 6 recommends, 'The Secret Garden', by Frances Hodge Burnett

This is an interesting book, because it is full of mystery about what happened before the story began and as the story unfolds. The characters are interesting, which makes the story even more interesting and mysterious. It makes me want to read more and more of it and I wish the book wouldn't end.

#### 'The Dream Snatcher, The Shadow Keeper and The Night Spinner' - a trilogy by Abi Elphinstone

These books are about a girl named Moll and her wild cat, Gryff. The book starts in Tanglefern Forest. Moll and her tribe are on a hunting trip for food when Gryff came from the mountains and finds the tribe and he and Moll become friends.

I decided to read these books because when I did Reading Gladiators with Mrs Robinson in Year 4, I read another book by Abi Elphinestone. I really enjoyed it, so I decided to read these books too.

I love these books because Moll and her friend Sid and Gryff have to solve puzzles, like anagrams, to find the special items. The puzzles are fun to think about.
