


I'd recommend it to anyone who likes gunny books, especially boys and girls red 6 to 10.


Why you like it? This is a great book to dip in and out of. Even reading a couple of pages will leave you thinking about your own response to some of the questions presented in the book.


Ellie in Year 3 recommends,
