


Bad Nana



Happy Birthday Elmer!


10-10:45am | Babbage Lecture Theatre | £7 | Age 3+




Armadillo and Hare



On the door

Unsold tickets will be available to purchase over the festival weekend at the Festival Box Office in the Old Divinity School.

Ticket delivery and collection

Tickets booked up to seven days in advance can be posted out for a charge of £1.50 or collected free of charge from the Cambridge Live Tickets Box Office up to the day before the event.

Festival Box Office

The Festival Box Office is run by **Cambridge Live Tickets**. During the Spring Festival 2019, the Box Office will be located at the Old Divinity School, St John's College. It will be open from **9am on Friday 5, Saturday 6 and Sunday 7 April 2019** to buy and collect prebooked tickets. All tickets for **5–7 April** must be collected or purchased here during the festival weekend. During this period, tickets will not be available to collect on the door of the event you are attending.

Please allow enough time to collect your tickets before your event starts to provide for queuing and travel between venues. It can take up to 25 minutes to walk from the Box Office to festival event venues.

Access

Refunds and exchanges

Refunds for unused tickets will only be made where an event is sold out or cancelled. If your event is sold out or cancelled and you do not want a refund, you can exchange your ticket for another event at the festival (subject to availability). If you are unable to use your ticket for a sold out event and wish to exchange it for another event, please contact the Box Office at least 48 hours before the festival starts.

Children

Proof of entitlement will be required


Concession prices are shown in the printed programme next to full-price adult ticket prices.

Young person standby tickets

People aged 25 and under can buy full-price adult tickets for half-price on the day of the event. Please visit the Festival Box Office at the Old Divinity School for more information. Proof of age will be required.

Latecomers

If you are late to an event, then you will only be admitted at the discretion of the steward(s). Seats will be reserved for latecomers. Please be considerate of others and allow enough time to pick up your tickets and arrive at your venue promptly. Refunds will not be given to latecomers.



How to get here

By car: The M11 links Cambridge from the south and London. The A14 is the main route from the east and west and also connects with the A1 and M1 from the north.

Parking: There are five Park & Ride sites located on the main routes around the city. For details see www.cambridgeparkandride.info.

By train: The railway station is a 15 minute walk to the city centre. There are frequent buses and taxis. Regular trains connect London to Cambridge from King's Cross and Liverpool Street. There are good services from Ely and King's Lynn, Bury St Edmunds, Norwich and Ipswich. Services from the north connect via Peterborough.

By bus: Stagecoach

(www.stagecoachbus.com) operates services into Cambridge from around the county and the guided busway (www.thebusway.info) runs a frequent service from Huntingdon to the city centre.
