As **geographers** we will:

- Locate the world's countries, using maps to focus on identifying the countries around the Pacific ring of fire
- Identify the position and significance of longitude, latitude, equator, northern hemisphere, southern hemisphere
- Use atlases, maps, globes and digital/computer mapping to locate countries and describe features studied
- Understand that the Ring of Fire is a string of volcanoes and sites of seismic activity
- Describe the impact extreme geographical events have on human life
- Compare and contrast the positive and negative impact of living next to a volcano

As writers we will:

Select and use imaginative vocabulary and devices, such as figurative language, to enhance their writing.

As **scientists** we will:

- Deepen their understanding of grammar and apply it to their writing appropriately.
- Use examples of stories read as a model to write their own

As mathematicians we will:

recognise that living things have changed over time and that fossils provide information about living things that inhabited the Earth millions of years ago recognise that living things produce offspring of the same kind, but normally

Ways to help your child at home...

- Make it clear to your child that you value homework set aside a specific time and area for your child to work on their homework.
