On the menu this week...

Starters

English and spelling: Practise the Year 3/4 and 5/6 spellings from your reading record. Write an imaginary journal entry (in the first person), imagining that you have switched off your phone, iPad, game consoles and PC for a week. Explain how it impacts on your life over the week. What might change and how would you cope? What might you do instead and imagine some of the positive as well as negative impacts. Try to include some great vocabulary, a full range of punctuation and paragraphing.

Maths: Continue to use TTRockstars daily. Use the BBC Maths lessons on BBC Bitesize.
Problem solving: Albert Einstein (1879– 1955), well known for his theory of relativity, enjoyed working on the subjects of Mathematics and Science. To be successful he knew that he had to work systematically, be resilient and take risks to make new discoveries. He came up with a riddle to challenge others to use these skills. Main Course

Be Creative: This week, there have been some articles in the press about flower arranging skills. This is the inspiration for your challenge this week. You can select and arrange some flowers and photograph them, draw or paint some flowers, develop a guide with illustrations for sewing and growing insect-friendly flowers, create paper flowers or even, embroider some. You could design a pattern to print onto a fabric or draw a flower inspired sketch from anything floral in your home or on-line.

P.S.H.E. Check all your settings for your on-line devices and accounts that you use at home and create a checklist to ensure that you remain safe online. Ask your family to review this list with you and the checks made. What smart questions can you ask yourself to check your security? Why do you think it is important to be safe online? (Parents—[This website](#) is very useful for your own knowledge of how to keep your children safe online.)

History: As we welcome the month of June, research the 2nd June. 1953 when on a cold and wet day in London, the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II took place in Westminster Abbey. Research how she came to be queen and write a short report explaining what happened at that coronation. Explain some of the symbolism of the event. What might be similar and different when future monarchs are crowned? You could also find out who is due to be the next monarch after Queen Elizabeth II.

This week, we heard that Michael Rosen was recovering from his recent illness. We will all know his We're Going on a Bear Hunt. He has written lots of poetry too. This week, read some of his poems and also see if you can memorise and perform some for your family.

Music: This week, we learned that the annual Proms concerts are cancelled. Did you know that women are some of the best up and coming conductors? Research *Mirga Gražinytė-Tyla* and find out how she came into her role. Listen to some orchestras led by famous conductors to inspire you. Let us know what music you have listened to and how it makes you feel.
